BRIEF DESCRIPTION: Addressing the scope of state fire service mobilization and ensuring compliance with existing state and federal disaster response policies. AN ACT Relating to the scope of state fire service mobilization and ensuring compliance with existing state and federal disaster response policies; amending RCW 43.43.960 and 43.43.961; and creating a new section.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

б NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. The legislature recognizes the vital role 7 that our state's fire service personnel play in responding not just to fires but to disasters of varying types and kinds. The legislature 8 further recognizes that the fire service mobilization plan has always 9 10 been intended to be utilized not just in wild land fire incidents, 11 but in all emergencies and disasters to which fire departments, fire regional 12 districts, and fire protection authorities typically respond. Accordingly, it is the intent of the legislature to clarify 13 that state fire service mobilization be allowed in all incidents to 14 15 which fire departments, fire districts, and regional fire protection 16 authorities typically respond, so long as the mobilization meets the 17 requirements identified in the Washington state fire service 18 mobilization plan.

19 Sec. 2. RCW 43.43.960 and 2003 c 405 s 1 are each amended to 20 read as follows:

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Unless the context clearly requires otherwise, the definitions in
this section apply throughout this subchapter.

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(1) "Chief" means the chief of the Washington state patrol.

4 (2) "State fire marshal" means the director of fire protection in 5 the Washington state patrol.

6 (3) "Fire chief" includes the chief officer of a statutorily 7 authorized fire agency, or the fire chief's authorized 8 representative. Also included are the department of natural resources 9 fire control chief, and the department of natural resources regional 10 managers.

11 (4) "Jurisdiction" means state, county, city, fire district, 12 <u>regional fire protection authority</u>, or port district ((firefighting)) 13 units, or other units covered by this chapter.

14 (5) "Mobilization" means that ((firefighting)) all risk resources regularly provided by fire departments, fire districts, and regional 15 16 fire protection authorities beyond those available through existing 17 agreements will be requested and, when available, sent in response to an emergency or disaster situation that has exceeded the capabilities 18 19 of available local resources. During a large scale emergency, mobilization includes the redistribution of regional or statewide 20 21 ((firefighting)) risk resources to either direct emergency incident assignments or to assignment in communities where ((firefighting)) 22 23 resources are needed.

When mobilization is declared and authorized as provided in this 24 25 chapter, all ((firefighting)) risk resources regularly provided by fire departments, fire districts, and regional fire protection 26 authorities including those of the host fire protection authorities, 27 i.e. incident jurisdiction, shall be deemed as mobilized under this 28 29 chapter, including those that responded earlier under existing mutual aid or other agreement. All nonhost fire protection authorities 30 31 providing ((firefighting)) resources in response to a mobilization declaration shall be eligible for expense reimbursement as provided 32 by this chapter from the time of the mobilization declaration. 33

This chapter shall not reduce or suspend the authority or responsibility of the department of natural resources under chapter 76.04 RCW.

37 (6) "Mutual aid" means emergency interagency assistance provided 38 without compensation under an agreement between jurisdictions under 39 chapter 39.34 RCW.

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1 <u>(7) "All risk resources" means those resources regularly provided</u> 2 by fire departments, fire districts, and regional fire protection 3 <u>authorities required to respond to incidents, including but not</u> 4 limited to:

- 5 <u>(a) Wild land fires;</u>
- 6 (b) Landslides;
- 7 <u>(c) Earthquakes;</u>
- 8 (d) Floods; and
- 9 <u>(e) Contagious diseases.</u>

10 **Sec. 3.** RCW 43.43.961 and 2003 c 405 s 2 are each amended to 11 read as follows:

Because of the possibility of the occurrence of disastrous fires 12 or other disasters of unprecedented size and destructiveness, the 13 need to insure that the state is adequately prepared to respond to 14 15 such a fire or disaster, the need to establish a mechanism and a procedure to provide for reimbursement to state agencies and local 16 ((firefighting)) agencies that respond to help others in time of need 17 or to a host fire district that experiences expenses beyond the 18 resources of the fire district, and generally to protect the public 19 20 peace, health, safety, lives, and property of the people of Washington, it is hereby declared necessary to: 21

(1) Provide the policy and organizational structure for large scale mobilization of ((firefighting)) <u>all risk</u> resources in the state through creation of the Washington state fire services mobilization plan;

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(2) Confer upon the chief the powers provided herein;

(3) Provide a means for reimbursement to state agencies and local
fire jurisdictions that incur expenses when mobilized by the chief
under the Washington state fire services mobilization plan; and

30 (4) Provide for reimbursement of the host fire department or fire 31 protection district when it has: (a) Exhausted all of its resources; 32 and (b) invoked its local mutual aid network and exhausted those 33 resources. Upon implementation of state fire mobilization, the host 34 district resources shall become state fire mobilization resources 35 consistent with the fire mobilization plan.

It is the intent of the legislature that mutual aid and other interlocal agreements providing for enhanced emergency response be encouraged as essential to the public peace, safety, health, and welfare, and for the protection of the lives and property of the Code Rev/LL:akl 3 S-0142.1/15 1 people of the state of Washington. If possible, mutual aid agreements should be without stated limitations as to resources available, time, 2 or area. Nothing in this chapter shall be construed or interpreted to 3 limit the eligibility of any nonhost fire protection authority for 4 reimbursement of expenses incurred in providing ((firefighting)) all 5 risk resources for mobilization provided that the mobilization must 6 meet the <u>requirements</u> identified in the Washington state fire service 7 mobilization plan. 8

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
