Ensure your Team is Prepared!

Driving Defensively Protects Everyone

FOCUS: Too many firefighters and civilians are injured or killed each year as the result of traffic accidents. We must use the same level of safety emphasis when driving as when fighting fires.

CHALLENGE

We know driving is one of the most dangerous tasks firefighters engage in. Our roadways are becoming more congested every day. Issues such as weather changes, construction, holidays and tourists make it even more difficult to travel the streets and highways safely to accomplish our tasks. Defensive driving techniques must be practiced to anticipate the errors made by other drivers on the roads we share if we are to get there safely! As professional drivers, we must excel at defensive driving. In order to accomplish our tasks safely we must anticipate driver errors and common mistakes.

We must expect the unpredictable and make the necessary adjustments to protect ourselves and the public. When in doubt we should slow down and yield the right of way and maintain safe distances from other vehicles in our path. Failure to do this can have deadly results!
